A Spring Like No Other: Surviving the Coronavirus

Our nation - and the world - was hit with the Coronavirus pandemic early this spring. Citizens went into "shelter in place" mode as businesses were temporarily shut down and events were cancelled. Lawton RSVP had to cancel the annual Birthday Banquet, National Service Recognition Day, and participation in the Senior for Creative Living's Heath & Wellness Fair and the City of Lawton's Spring Open Streets Fair.

Many of our volunteer stations had to reduce or modify their services as they didn't want to risk exposure for their clients/volunteers and to limit the spread of this virus. Yet this didn't stop volunteer stations from creatively providing services to our community with limited/restricted resources! Here's how some of our stations survived the temporary flow of diminished volunteer services:

Brookridge Retirement Community: Staff provided arts and crafts in small groups, Coffee with Veterans Video Chat with Mayor Stan Booker, Bible Study via video chat, and movie groups for under 10 people with different session times.

Lawton Food Bank: Provided drive-through services and continued giving out books for children via drive-through.

Lawton/Fort Sill Veterans Center:

Veterans continued one-on-one activities such as reading, puzzles, and gardening. The Center also got Ipads that Veterans used to face-time family members.

Lawton Public Library: The library issued digital cards for citizens to access ebooks, audiobooks, movies and music. They also provided curbside book delivery and free printing services.

Leah M. Fitch Cancer Center: Volunteers continued to provide transportation for patients.

Hearts that Care Volunteer Clinic: Staff provided modified procedures to avoid grouping of people at the same time.

St. John's Missionary Baptist Church:

RSVP volunteers continued to provide meals

to those in need: 1,684 meals served in March and 1,942 during April.

For the 25th annual Day of Service Act RSVP held a hygiene product donation drive through the month of January. RSVP collected over 600 items including soap, body lotion, shampoo, shaving items, toothpaste and brushes, socks, mouthwash, washcloths, travel items and so much more!

Items were donated to the C. Carter Crane Center for Advancement and Empowerment, a homeless shelter located at 1203 SW Texas Avenue, Lawton.

Thank you to all the volunteers and community members who graciously donated items for those in need in our community!

Hearts That Care Opens New Volunteer Clinic

RSVP Partner, Hearts That Care Volunteer Health Clinic, opened their new facility at 1313 W Gore Boulevard on May 7. They have been a partner station since 2018 and provide free healthcare and medications for low-income Lawton residents without health insurance or who cannot be seen anywhere else.

The new facility includes five patient rooms within their 5,000 sq. ft. facility and includes 10×10 rooms and real doors - as opposed to shower curtains!

On opening night they saw 29 patients with 4 providers and 40+ patients received new medications or refills.

Volunteers can interact with veterans in a variety of activities at the center: Painting, drawing, jewelry making, woodworking, gardening, leather work, or putting together a model. There are also opportunities to assist the activities director, work at the front desk or assist in the cafeteria.


