
## Good Practices:

- Stop drips: Check for oil leaks and fix them promptly. Keep your car tune to reduce oil use.
- Be Prepaired: Collect all used oil in containers with tight fitting lids.
- Clean Spills Immediately: Use ground cloths or drip pans beneath your vehicle if you have leaks or are doing engine work.
- Dispose of it Correctly:

  Take used oil to autoparts stores or mechanics. Never pour it down the storm drain, on the ground or into a ditch.
- Recycle used motor oil:
  Taking used oil to a proper disposal site
  will lead to it being recycled. You can
  also buy recycled ("refined") motor oil to
  use in your car!

#### Oil and Water Don't Mix!




Used motor oil is the largest single source of oil pollution in our lakes, rivers and streams.



# What is The Problem?

Oil does not dissolve in water. Oil and other petroleum products are toxic to people, wildlife and plants. Oil that leaks from our cars onto roads, driveways and parking lots is picked up in stormwater runoff and washed into storm drains which takes it diretly to a creek, river or lake.



## Did You Know?

- Each Year Americans spill 180 million gallons of used oil into our waters. That is about the same amount that BP released in the Gulf Oil Spill and 16 times the amount Exxon Valdez spilled off the coast of Alaska.
- One pint of oil can make a slick larger than a football field.
- Oil sticks to everything from beach sand to bird feathers.
- Used motor oil can be recycled at many auto parts stores. Check your local store for details.
