

Part 1 Crime, the most severe of crimes, is down 7.9% compared to 2019.




### SOLID WASTE- COLLECTION AND LANDFILL



The City of Lawton's expenses for governmental activities were \$87.8 million and were funded with taxes and other general revenues totaling \$86.7 million in addition to program revenues of \$41.0 million.

### Financial Highlights for Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2021

The City's total net position increased by \$39.2 million or 13.33% from the prior year, while the negative portion of the unrestricted net position decreased by \$21.2 million or 47%.

In the City's business-type activities, such as utilities, program revenues exceed expenses by \$19.6 million.
